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

Q12: What are the greatest challenges for Arizona over the next two to four years?

The greatest challenges Arizona has is dealing effectively with its inevitable growth. We have to be looking to the future in all of our decisions. Building and maintaining infrastructure that will stand the test of time should be a primary focus. By infrastructure I am referring to our transportation system, sustenance of our environment particularly water and air, our access to clean, renewable and sustainable power, our education and corrections systems.

We need to prepare through comprehensive tax reform that lessons our dependency on sales tax, comprehensive sentencing reform that interrupts the unsustainable trajectory we are on in regard to incarcerating people and finally planning effectively for inevitable growth.

We need to elect people who are foward looking who don't bog the state down by promoting social agendas that don't contribute to the greater good.

We have to have the courage to tackle difficult issues like tax and sentencing reform. As a State Senator I will continue to bring these issues forward. I want to promote the notion that government and business are partners in developing Arizona in ways that are sustainable and meet the needs of future generations.
