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

Q12: What are the greatest challenges for Arizona over the next two to four years?

Arizona must be more pro-active in attracting businesses to the state and supporting those locally-owned businesses that have struggled so long here.

We must support public education and hold all educational institutions accountable for our taxpayer dollars. If we want to attract businesses to Arizona and support those businesses that are already here, we must deliver a qualified, diverse workforce.

Q13: What would you do to overcome these challenges?

I have a strong history in the legislature working across the isle. In my first term as a legislator, I was the only freshman Democrat in the House to pass a bill. The bill allowed schools to save money by using reverse auctions for school procurement.

Since my time in office, I have fought to increase the number of competitive congressional and legislative districts in order to increase the opportunities for bi-partisan and less extreme legislation. Our legislature is not doing its job because it is too focused on pandering to its base voters.

The lack of infrastructure spending that your organization seeks is a direct result of a Republican legislature that has, as a result of redistricting, moved so far to the right that it cannot find the votes to do what is necessary.

A 2012 study by the Federal Department of Water Reclamation (with other partners) demonstrates that we will likely have a 20% shortfall in the water that enters the lower Colorado River Basin. As a realtor, I am helping people purchase homes with 30-year loans. What will their homes be worth if we do not find better, more efficient ways to use water, transport people and manage public spaces? Simply put, these goals require public investment.

Oppose, Q16: Do you support or oppose raiding the Highway User Revenue Fund (HURF) and Vehicle License Tax Why? (VLT) to balance the state budget? The HURF and VLT not only should not be siphoned off to balance the budget, it needs to be reconfigured entirely. The gas tax needs to be a proportional tax rather than a flat tax. Not only does this tax not give us the necessary funds for infrastructure, it is not keeping pace with our forms of transportation. As a person who drives a hybrid vehicle. I understand that people with alternative fuel cars (primarily electric) are not paying in to the HURF as much as they use the roads. So, not only do I believe that the gas tax should be proportional to the price of fuel, but also that the increasing number of electric car users should pay a flat fee as part of their VLT that is based on estimates of standard vehicle use in Arizona.
