## Q12: What are the greatest challenges for Arizona over the next two to four years?

Although we are slowly climbing out of the recession, lack of State Revenues will still be a challenge for the next few years. These limited resources continue to plague the adequate funding needed for infrastructure, education, public safety and other necessary services. The restructuring of Child Protective Services this year is a good start but it will need our full attention in the next few years to ensure it is done correctly and efficiently. Lastly, we will continue to see Education as a top priority to get Arizona to the top of the National Standards both on the K-12 level and at the Higher Education level as well.

### Q13: What would you do to overcome these challenges?

My priorities are steadfast. It takes a strong economy to provide the services needed in our State. Investing some of our limited financial resources into infrastructure not only fulfills our commitment to the taxpayers, but also creates the jobs and revenues needed to support other essential services. We must also address additional revenues needed to fully fund our infrastructure. Fuel taxes equal to the national average, Public Private Partnerships, Valued Engineering and energy efficient vehicles are just of few of the options we should start addressing immediately. Additionally, we need to address serious reforms in our education system. Additional funding is only part of the solution. It should be coupled with a reduction in federal bureaucracy and returning discipline and respect back into the classrooms.

In addition, we must make this a top priority with other state organizations who will help educate our voters and help with the financial resources needed to get a referendum or initiative passed.
