

Q12: What are the greatest challenges for Arizona over the next two to four years?

Eliminating debt and getting to a truly balanced budget, regulatory and tax reform. Crafting an infrastructure reconditioning plan and executing on it. Installation of a 6 Sigma mindset.

Q13: What would you do to overcome these challenges?

We will always have more priorities than resources, as in business we will need to make tough decisions about what gets a yes and what gets a no for project finding. One option for a starting point is zero base budgeting.

Q14: Do you understand the relationship between infrastructure and the economy? Please explain.

In Pima County for example 68% of District 1 road are in poor or failed condition.
